It is about getting the **right people** and the **right resources** to the **right place** at the **right time** to do the **right thing**.

- What about environmental expertise?
- What about environmental resources?
- Which is the location with the greatest need, based on an alignment of humanitarian need and environmental impact?
- Which actions related to environment should be prioritised?



Formal vs. informal disaster response:


Formal

- Government and local authorities;
- International humanitarian response system: UN, donors, regional organisations;
- National Red Cross society;
- Civil society;
- Military.


Informal

- Affected people and communities;
- Neighbourhood groups and NGOs;
- Militia/rebels;
- Religious groups;
- Private sector.












"Cluster" approach:

- Lead agency in each sector;
- Objective: a more predictable response;
- Cluster leads are "providers of last resort" in case of gaps in their sectors;
- Where is environment??



Who's who?

Humanitarian	Environment Ministry of Environment		
Civil protection / NEMO			
NEMO local offices or civil defence branches	Local government environment department? Autonomous environmental corporation? Departments: Forestry, water resources, urban affairs, etc		
Red Cross	Equivalent?		
UN agencies – OCHA, UNHCR (establish presence on the ground if not present already)	 UN environmental agencies: UNEP (often not present in country); UNDP (often without environmental emergency experience, mandate is recovery) 		
Sector coordination: UNICEF, WHO, IOM, WFP etc	Equivalent?		
International humanitarian NGOs	International environmental NGOs and advocacy groups		
Local humanitarian or development NGOs	Local environmental or development NGOs		

Civil society and community groups



Our interests are not so different....

- 1. Environmental degradation / pollution can directly contribute to or cause a crisis;
- 2. Underlying environmental factors can worsen existing humanitarian needs;
- 3. Environment can affect long-term survival, coping, recovery and long-term resilience;
- 4. The response can damage the environment if not designed carefully Do No Harm principle;
- 5. The response could be used to improve environmental management. Build back better.



But we're under lockdown.....

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Contact management – for on the ground and remote support:

- Finding environmental professionals responding to the disaster and who to offer your (remote) support to;
- Searching for specific contacts (e.g. a cluster coordinator);
- Better understand responder capacity and gaps;
- Providing the right people with the right information;

- Environmental work must be integrated in the overall humanitarian operation – it will not be considered a priority if it does not appear to save lives or livelihoods;
- There are many actors but this also means many potential allies and sources to work with, if you go in with a collaborative mindset;
- Get involved in humanitarian coordination to contribute to the response, not just to police it!
- We need to find a way to speak each other's language environmental issues ARE humanitarian issues and humanitarian issues ARE environmental issues.

High middle-income countries
 Capacities vs. inequalities

Exposed to natural disasters and increased humanitarian impact



Often impacted by environmental emergencies



Now the epicenter of the global pandemic



Despite challenges LAC is receptive to international humanitarian cooperation



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Integrating environmental emergencies component in the field



Some UNDAC missions in LAC and EE (Haiti 2016; Mexico 2017; Colombia 2018; Bahamas 2018...)



The importance of training and capacity building (e.g., Regional Environmental Training in Mexico)



Creation of a regional roster to strengthen environmental emergency readiness and response in LAC



Some preliminary insights...

- ✓ To raise awarenesss on the importance of EE in rapid response (to save lives)
- ✓ To integrate EE into the priorities in UNDAC missions
- ✓ To understand the linkages beetween environmental and humanitarian impact
- ✓ To bridge between inmediate to medium- and long-term solutions

Beirut explosion




Humanitarian impact

- 6,000 + people injured
- 30 + people reported missing
- About 300,000 displaced






Coordination structure - External





Coordination structure - Internal




